

What We Should Collect




Anything else that the pond has been involved in and documented.



Who Should Be Involved

Pond members who have a deep love for Blue Goose and the desire to collect and keep pond memorabilia. They should determine who will act as chief historian, willing to maintain the records and gather the information.



Committee Process



Decide what the pond wants to capture, what you want to know and why you are doing it.

Plan your work and work your plan.



Don't reinvent the wheel. You might see your work reduced dramatically.






Make a list of necessary equipment, people and materials.

Make a sequence of tasks and end dates.

Set specific time lines for tasks. Thinking ahead will help you foresee pitfalls.





Continuously conduct update reports where needed.

Where are you with the project? This can be a great report piece for the pond.

When completed, store your primary sources and copy in a safe, secure place.

You want to ensure that they don't become lost and are easily retrievable for updates. This will vary for each pond.
